YEAR 5 SCIENCE



This term the Year 5 class have been learning about chemical reactions and how these can be used as fuel to create movement. We learned that when we mix bicarbonate soda and vinegar, a gas called carbon dioxide is created. We wanted to use this gas, CO₂, as fuel to run the boats we made from plastic bottles and other recycled items we had collected. Here are some accounts of what happened:

“It went forward and it took a while to move and I think we had too many straws. The chemical reaction was that it fizzed up and the CO₂ made the boat go forward.” Toby

“The first time we tried to launch it, it failed and we realised that we did not have the desired amount of CO₂ gas, so we increased the amount of bicarbonate soda and vinegar.” Jackson

“It took a couple of seconds to move, but it still didn’t move very well. It’s because the straws were blocked. Some were blocked because the hot glue was squishing them.” Annika

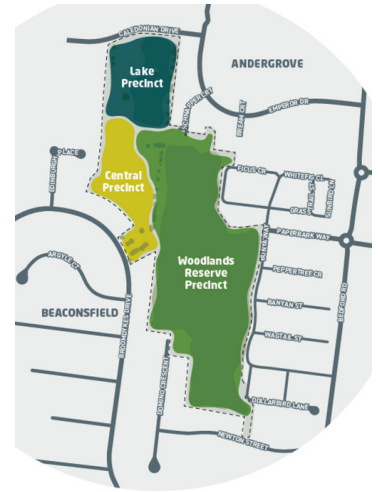

WOODLANDS DISTRICT PARK PLAYGROUND TO BE FAST-TRACKED

A new inclusive all-abilities playground is set to be built as part of stage one of the Woodlands District Park project.

The playground, which was initially planned to be constructed as part of stage three, has been brought forward thanks to a \$1.5 million commitment from council. Council’s funding is in addition to about \$2 million, which has been contributed by the Queensland Government’s Works for Queensland program.

The 21-hectare site will cater to Andergrove, Beaconsfield and Kerrisdale communities and will include an adult changing facility for the disabled community. The upgraded park includes the ‘Woodlands Track’ which will be suitable for all ages and every type of wheeled device – bicycles, skateboards, scooters, roller blades and skates, as well as running.

Civil works to improve drainage, a new path network and lighting will begin mid-year, with construction of the playground and ‘Woodlands Track’ during the 2022-2023 financial year, weather permitting.

Stage one will include:

- A new all-abilities playground
- Multipurpose ‘WoodlandsTrack’
- New barbecue and picnic facilities
- Public amenities and adult changing facilities for the disabled community
- Improvements to the park’s entry along Broomdykes Drive
 - Additional pathways with a new cross-park connection
 - Drainage and landscaping improvements

This project is proudly funded by the Queensland Government’s Works for Queensland Program in association with Mackay Regional Council.
