IMPORTANT UPDATE: NEW PROCEDURE FOR LATE ARRIVALS

At Carlisle, the safety and wellbeing of our students remain our highest priority. To help us maintain accurate attendance records and ensure every student is accounted for, we are implementing a new procedure for late arrivals.

Effective immediately, any student arriving late to school must be accompanied by a parent to be signed in at the office, or present a written late note.

This measure ensures we know who is on campus at all times and that students are arriving safely and with appropriate supervision.

We kindly ask for your support in reinforcing the importance of punctuality and helping your child arrive at school on time. If lateness is unavoidable, please assist us by following the new signin procedure.

REMINDER: SCHOOL JEWELLERY POLICY

We would like to take this opportunity to remind all families of our school's jewellery policy.

To maintain both the safety of our students and the integrity of our school uniform, students are not permitted to wear jewellery during school hours. This includes clear bracelets, bands, chains, earrings, studs, and rings.

The only exceptions to this policy are:

- One small, plain stud (2mm or less) in silver or gold in each ear, or
- One small 10mm sleeper in each ear.

This policy helps us uphold our uniform standards and minimises the risk of injury during physical activities such as sport and practical lessons.

Students have been reminded of this policy during this week's assembly, and further communication has been provided via the Term 2 Letter. We kindly ask for your support in ensuring your child adheres to these guidelines.

If you have any questions or wish to discuss your child's individual circumstances, please don't hesitate to contact us. However, please be aware that non-compliance without prior communication may result in disciplinary action in accordance with our school's procedures.

We appreciate your ongoing cooperation in helping us provide a safe, positive, and consistent learning environment for all students.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

The school has partnered with MSP Photography to capture their school records this year, and you're invited to purchase prints of your child.

On photo day, every student will be photographed, whether you choose to make a purchase or not.

Your child will bring home a personalised order envelope with a secure SHOOTKEY from the photographers. Please take a moment to read and follow the instructions carefully.

You can place your order online by SHOOTKEY, QR code or use cash in your student's envelope.

Alternately, you can talk to one of the Photographers on the day to arrange payment.

REMEMBER: PLACE YOUR ORDER ON OR BEFORE PHOTO DAY. This will ensure your order is processed smoothly and help you avoid any additional fees.

SIBLING PHOTOS

Sibling photos are available only for siblings attending the same school. A sibling envelope will be sent home with the eldest child in your family. Please follow the instructions on the envelope if you wish to order sibling photos.

If your eldest child does not bring home a sibling envelope, you can call your school's office or MSP for their secure SHOOTKEY before photo day to be able to order Online.

Alternately, you can talk to one of the Photographers on the day to arrange the sibling photo and payment.

Only pre-ordered sibling photos will be taken on photo day.

NOTE: Online sibling orders close at midday the day before photo day. Cash orders will still be accepted on photo day.



WELLBEING

Being a parent means you are your child's first and most important teacher and one of the most meaningful ways you can support your child's development is by helping them learn to read.

Reading is closely linked with language development, and one of the best ways to build your child's language and reading ability is by nurturing a love of reading in a relaxed, positive home environment. It's not about pushing early skills before school begins it's about creating enjoyable experiences that build confidence, interest, and curiosity.



Children who are read to and with often develop stronger reading skills and more positive attitudes towards reading. These children typically start school with an understanding of how books work, a growing vocabulary, and a sense of how language sounds and flows foundations that help schools build successful readers.

Reading doesn't need to be hard work—it can be fun! There are no real shortcuts, but time, patience, and lots of enjoyable reading experiences are powerful tools. And perhaps most importantly, your encouragement and praise help build your child's confidence and joy in learning.

Here are some simple ways you can help your child develop a love of reading:

Make Reading a Natural Part of Everyday Life

- Read storybooks aloud to your child regularly.
- Let your child handle and care for books.
- Use reading to communicate: write notes on the fridge or lunchbox.
- Read aloud letters or cards your family receives.
- Join the local library and visit as a family.
- Display a positive attitude about reading it's both important and pleasurable.
- Be a reading role model let your child see you reading!
- Talk about what you're reading and why.
- Read together from a variety of sources: food labels, street signs, recipes, TV guides, shop signs, and magazines.
- Give books as gifts or rewards and consider a special reading light for bedtime stories.





WELLBEING

Talk and Listen

Everyday conversations help build the language skills that are essential for reading.

- Take time to listen to your child's ideas—mealtime is a great opportunity.
- Discuss family plans, current events, and TV programs.
- Choose shows or music together and talk about what you watch or hear.
- Share audiobooks or podcasts that encourage imagination and discussion.

Write Together

Writing goes hand-in-hand with reading. It helps children develop a love for words.

- Write letters, cards, and messages with your child.
- Create simple books from shared experiences—let your child tell the story in their own words and add drawings or photos.
- Set up a pen pal connection for regular letter writing and reading.

Make Learning Fun Through Play

Play-based learning is a fantastic way to support reading.

- Enjoy games like Snakes and Ladders, Junior Scrabble, and memory games.
- Create fun treasure hunts with written clues.
- Try "old-fashioned" games, rhymes, and songs that help develop memory, sequencing, and listening skills.
- Don't worry about what's trendy—use toys and games that encourage imagination and engagement.

Support for Struggling Readers

For children in Grades 1–3 who find reading difficult, the Links at Home – Reading Program is a free online tool that helps parents support reading development. It teaches the basics of Systematic Synthetic Phonics and offers games and activities to build confidence and skills at home.

Helping your child learn to read is one of the greatest gifts you can give. At Carlisle, we believe that fostering a love of learning starts with the little things—like a bedtime story, a word of praise, or a shared laugh over a funny book. Happy reading!
