POLICE VISIT TO YEAR 5 & 6

On Wednesday 17 June, Sergeant Smith and Officer Boreham from Queensland Police Mackay came to Carlisle to talk to students in Year 5 & 6 about how to protect themselves and their information and how to keep themselves safe online.

Afterwards, students said that what surprised them most about the talk was when Sergeant Smith shared this true story:

A 14-year-old girl met a teenage boy online and they became friends over a period of a few months. Before the next school holidays, the boy told the girl that he and his family were coming to Mackay, and he was hoping that they could meet up.

The girl was feeling a little uncomfortable about this and showed her mum the chats she had been having with the boy. Mum became suspicious and asked a friend who was a police detective to take a look, and from then on, the police took over the matter.

When the “teenage boy” stepped off the plane in Mackay, the police met him at the airport, and it turned out that he was actually a 56-year-old man who had been pretending to be a teenager so he could make friends with the young girl.

Year 5 proudly opened its classroom doors to share their HASS assignments with students and staff from across the primary school.

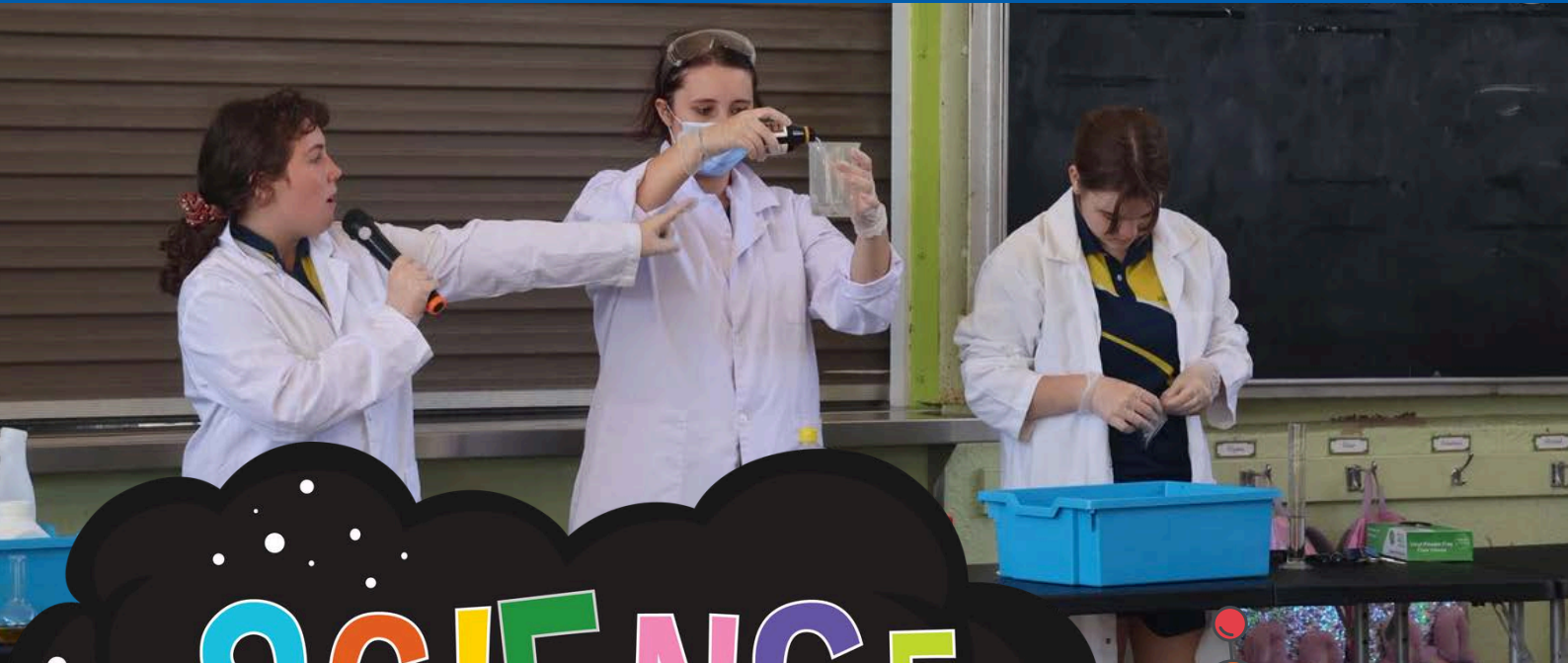

SCIENCE



our Year 7 and Year 9 students stepped into the role of teachers as they shared their scientific learning with our Prep to Year 2 classes through a range of engaging, hands on experiences.

The Year 9 students brought chemistry to life with exciting demonstrations of chemical reactions, including Elephant Toothpaste, slime creation, and the classic reaction between bicarbonate of soda and vinegar. The younger students were captivated as they observed changes in colour, texture, and reaction speed, sparking plenty of curiosity and questions.

Meanwhile, our Year 7 students showcased their zoology investigations, clearly explaining animal classifications, adaptations, and scientific names. Their presentations helped our younger learners better understand the diversity of living things and how animals are grouped and studied in science.

It was a wonderful opportunity for peer learning across year levels, with Prep to Year 2 students actively engaged and enthusiastic throughout the sessions. Our secondary students also demonstrated confidence, clear communication, and a strong understanding of their scientific concepts as they shared their knowledge with others.

SECONDARY

SENIOR AQUATICS – KITE SURFING

Our Year 11 and Year 12 students recently headed out to Far Beach for a hands on kitesurfing experience with Smile Kitesurfing School, and yes, there was plenty of learning, a few wobbly moments, and some very determined attempts to master the wind.

Across the sessions, students were introduced to the fundamentals of kitesurfing in a safe, supportive and occasionally very windy environment. They learned how to set up equipment, control the kite, and most importantly, how not to let the kite control them. Safety procedures were a key focus, along with building confidence in reading real world conditions.

Students also explored how wind, weather, tides and environmental hazards all play a role in decision-making when participating in aquatic activities. There were a few moments where the wind clearly had its own ideas, which only added to the learning experience.



The program was structured so both year groups could learn from participation and observation. Year 11 students took on the practical component while Year 12 observed, offered encouragement, and silently promised themselves they would do it better when it was their turn. Then the roles were reversed, and Year 12 stepped into the action while Year 11 provided support from the sidelines.

This approach gave all students the chance to build understanding, confidence and appreciation for the skill involved, while also recognising that kitesurfing is one of those sports that looks easier when someone else is doing it.

A big thank you to Smile Kitesurfing School for their expert instruction and patience, and to our students for their enthusiasm, resilience, and willingness to be occasionally outsmarted by a kite. The excursion at Far Beach with Smile Kitesurfing School provided a memorable and valuable learning experience that combined skill development, safety awareness and a healthy respect for the power of the wind.

SECONDARY

MACKAY YOUNG MAYORS

Last week, we were visited by Savannah Vella from Mackay Regional Council, who spoke with our eligible students about the Mackay Young Mayors program.

This inspiring initiative gives young people the opportunity to step into leadership, share their ideas, and have a voice in shaping the future of their community.

Students who apply will take part in a range of workshops, both online and in person, designed to build confidence, develop leadership skills, and support them through the nomination and campaigning process.

Candidates are encouraged to share their goals and ideas with the wider community, helping others understand why they would like to be part of the Youth Council. Throughout the journey, they are supported to campaign in a way that suits them, with guidance and encouragement at every stage.

A panel of young people reviews all nominations, and selected candidates then move forward to campaign within the community. Voting takes place at schools and community venues across Mackay, where young people will elect 12 members to represent them on the Youth Council.

If elected, students will take part in an induction program and a special swearing in ceremony at council, before working together to develop a shared vision for young people in Mackay. The term of office runs from February 2027 to June 2028.

For those not selected, the journey does not end there, with ongoing opportunities to stay involved and continue advocating for issues that matter to them.

Key dates include nominations closing on 20 July, Meet the Candidates on 8 October, Election Week from 19 to 23 October, and inductions in November.

This week has been filled with fun learning and play experiences as the children explored the story of Jesus and His disciples and the Great Catch of Fish. We talked about trusting God in all situations and knowing that He loves and cares for us.

A highlight was our visit to the big school playground, where the children explored, played, and built confidence in their new environment. We also enjoyed Show and Tell, with Nils and Oliver confidently sharing their special items with the group.

DISCOVER CAPE HILLSBOROUGH

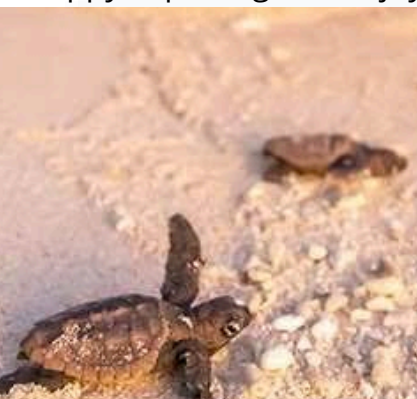

RECIPE

FAMILY BUILD-YOUR-OWN VEGGIE BURRITO BAR

This is less a strict recipe and more a shared cooking experience, perfect for holidays when everyone is in and out of the kitchen.

Ingredients (mix and match)

Base:

- Soft tortillas or wraps
- Cooked rice (white or brown) or quinoa

Veggies (chop ahead or prep together):

- Capsicum (bell peppers)
- Corn kernels
- Cherry tomatoes
- Lettuce or spinach
- Avocado
- Red onion (optional)

Protein options:

- Black beans or kidney beans (canned, rinsed)
- Scrambled eggs (optional if you want ovo-vegetarian)
- Grated cheese

Extras:

- Salsa
- Sour cream or Greek yoghurt
- Lime wedges
- Mild spice mix (paprika, cumin, garlic powder)

How to make it a family activity

1. Set up a “prep station”
2. Everyone has a job: washing, chopping (kids with safe knives), opening cans, or grating cheese.
3. Cook the base together
4. Heat rice or quinoa. Warm beans with a little cumin and garlic for extra flavour.
5. Build the burrito bar
6. Lay everything out in bowls like a mini buffet.
7. Wrap and roll competition (optional fun!)
8. See who can make the neatest or most creative burrito.


